HOW CCF HAS BEEN RESPONDING TO THE CRISIS

Over the past 8 months the Cambridgeshire Community Foundation (CCF) has been responding to the COVID-19 pandemic that has affected individuals and communities in an unprecedented way.

We have been overwhelmed by the generous support of the general public and key donors who have made it possible exceed an initial fundraising target of over £1 Million. These donations have allowed us to provide over 200 grants to community organisations and charities across the county who have been doing vital work.

Since March, CCF has successfully awarded emergency grants of up to £5,000, and more recently longer term recovery grants of up to £25,000.

The role of CCF has never been more important in inspiring philanthropy. The organisations that we have funded have demonstrated the value of giving grants to local charities and organisations – they are close to local need, cost effective and get the job done.





Over the past 8 months we have provided funding to over 200 charities and community organisations across the county who have been doing incredible work to support those impacted by the pandemic. From the provision of food and other essential items, to addressing digital poverty in order to tackle isolation, the response was truly amazing. We would like to take this opportunity to showcase just a few of the organisations that have received funding through the Cambridgeshire Coronavirus Community Fund and the impressive things they have been able to achieve.

ALL IN SOUND

£2,000 GRANT AWARDED | COUNTYWIDE



All In Sound is a Registered Charity (CIO) that is committed to providing high quality music-making and singing opportunities for those who may otherwise not be able to access them, in a safe and inclusive environment.

They received a grant of £2,000 to support 60 people living with dementia and their carers with an online music-making and singing group, including support with technology, gentle exercise and movement

Having completed the project, All In Sound told us that taking part in these sessions has had a huge impact on the lives of people who are very vulnerable


ROWAN

£5,000 GRANT AWARDED | CAMBRIDGE CITY



For over 36 years Rowan has provided a safe, creative, enriching and welcoming environment where the arts are used as a tool to bring people together, tackle social exclusion whilst developing skills and potential and improving happiness, health and wellbeing.

The £5,000 grant allowed Rowan to continue to support local adults with a learning disability through providing activity packs, online classes and regular phone contact.



WITH THE GRANT RECEIVED ROWAN HAVE HELPED INCREASE HAPPINESS, HEALTH AND WELLBEING BY PROVIDING FUN ACTIVITIES TO DO WHILST AT HOME DURING LOCKDOWN.

Rowan have arranged online sessions via Zoom which has had a positive impact on their students mental health and wellbeing as they have been able to meet up with friends and seen new friendships grow.

Rowan explained that their students are at higher risk of loneliness and social isolation, during 'normal' times and know that they have helped reduce loneliness and social isolation during these strange and unprecedented times. Many of their students have struggled to understand why they can't meet their friends and have really struggled during lockdown.



CAMBRIDGESHIRE SEARCH AND RESCUE



£608 GRANT AWARDED | COUNTYWIDE



Cambridgeshire Search and Rescue (CamSAR) is the Lowland Rescue unit covering our county. They are a specialist team, called upon by Police in the search for vulnerable missing people: a child, an elderly person living with dementia or even someone who is considering taking their own life. In each case, and many others, an emergency response is vital.

A grant of £608 was awarded to Cambridgeshire Search and Rescue to purchase PPE and other health and safety supplies in order to continue to search for vulnerable missing people, distribute food, and provide additional emergency services to 3,000 people as required by the Cambridgeshire Constabulary during a time in which the usual fundraising events are not possible

Some of the key facts reported include:

- Made the first delivery on March 31.
- Been out 56 days of the 67 days since.
- 724 man-hours spent delivering supplies.
- 21 different volunteers involved.
- Driven 17,180 miles.
- Most miles in one day - 1,940 (in 86 man-hours).
- Delivered food to 1,633 shielded persons.
- Given 1,252 volunteer hours so far this year.

OPEN DOOR BAPTIST CHURCH - MILFIELD COMMUNITY FRIDGE

£2,000 GRANT AWARDED | PETERBOROUGH

The primary objective of the Open Door Baptist Church is to nurture and grow as a welcoming and loving multi-ethnic community. £2,000 was awarded to the organisation to cover transport, packaging and cleaning costs of delivering food parcels and cooked meals to 200 self-isolating older and vulnerable people.

WITH THE HELP OF 12 VOLUNTEERS, THEY DELIVERED 745 FOOD PARCELS TO THOSE WHO WERE ELDERLY, SELF ISOLATING AND VULNERABLE AND SAFELY SERVED 6247 PEOPLE WITH FOOD. THIS WAS BOTH ESSENTIAL GROCERIES AND EITHER SOUP AND SANDWICHES OR HOT FOOD.



BENEFICIARY 1

Ann is a single lady in her 80s. Ann has many underlying health conditions and was self isolating during the lockdown and continues to severely limit her contact with the outside world. One of her health issues is that she has to follow a gluten free diet. Having food available which does not contain gluten along with the fresh fruit and veg from the Fridge has helped Ann's health. She has been able to have someone to chat to in her isolation and loneliness.



CAMBRIDGESHIRE REUSE & RECYCLING NETWORK (CCORRN)

£4,200 GRANT AWARDED | FENLAND



CCORRN was founded in 2003 as a social enterprise to be an impartial and independent organisation incepted to support community reuse and recycling. Working closely with local community groups, social enterprises, charities, local authorities, government departments as well as private companies; CCORRN aims to provide goods, services and volunteering opportunities that positively contribute socially and environmentally.

The Box of Rainbows scheme usually donates crafts resources to children with chronic illnesses however having seen the level of need in the community caused by the COVID-19 lockdown, CCORRN felt compelled to respond and approached partner organisations to help them expand the scheme to hundreds more local families in need.

Through a £4,200 grant, this project has provided free creative resources to hundreds of families, the first 200 boxes went to over 450 children and thanks to the additional funding it brought the total to 800 boxes.

CAMBRIDGE SUSTAINABLE FOOD ALLIANCE

£10,000 GRANT AWARDED | CAMBRIDGE CITY



Cambridge Sustainable Food is an innovative and growing partnership of public, private and community organisations in Cambridge and the surrounding villages. They work with each other to promote a vibrant local food system all along the supply chain and in our community.

Cambridge Sustainable Food applied for £10,000 to set up the Cambridge Coronavirus Emergency Food Project Cambridge Food Poverty Alliance (CFPA) which quickly mobilised in late March 2020 to develop a structure of food support for vulnerable residents. CFPA is a collaborative network of organisations who have been working together on food access issues since 2018, and published the first Food Poverty Action Plan for the city in 2019.

BENEFICIARY 1

Following contact from an individual who had just been put on the shielded list we discovered they had almost no food in the house, very little money and was unable to go out. Their usual support had been taken ill, so they felt very alone and was going hungry. We were able to get them a delivery from their local food hub to tide them over until they were able to get a delivery slot.

BENEFICIARY 2

A single parent on a zero hour contract had very little food left in the house to feed themselves or their two children. They were feeling really desperate and frightened about what they would do. We were able to organise a food bank voucher while we spoke and direct them to a food hub that was open that day so they could access food straight away.

During the first week of operation, the partnership between local chefs, businesses, Cambridge Colleges Catering Managers Committee, volunteers, local churches, community groups and Cambridge Regional College, achieved:

- 60 families supported
- 34 meals distributed to Community Food Hubs
- Over 800 portions of cooked food produced and 190 bags of shopping
- 900 kg of food donated and processed through the kitchens, going either into meals delivered by our volunteers or sorted into shopping bags
- 154 volunteering hours.



CARESCO

£5,000 GRANT AWARDED | HUNTINGDON



"THE IMPACT OF OUR PROJECTS SINCE MARCH 23RD HAS BEEN OVERWHELMINGLY POSITIVE. MAINTAINING OUR CONTACT AND WIDENING OUR OUTREACH INTO THE COMMUNITY HAS MEANT THAT WE HAVE INCLUDED MANY VULNERABLE AND SOCIALLY ISOLATING RESIDENTS WHO WOULD OTHERWISE HAVE STRUGGLED WITH BASIC DAILY TASKS THAT THEY ARE NORMALLY CAPABLE OF DOING THEMSELVES."

CARESCO as an organisation supports numerous clubs and activities within the community. Most of these activities, including all of their income streams, have been suspended due to the coronavirus, with the exception of the Foodbank and a newly created outreach programme which started to offer support to the members of the suspended clubs, many of whom are elderly and or vulnerable. Sawtry Foodbank offers emergency food for local people in crisis.

With the £5,000 grant, CARESCO were able to support 419 people by providing:

- Food bank - Delivering food to local people in crisis.
- Outreach/Support programme for Day Club members - members were provided emotional and practical support through phone calls. The wider community was also supported through shopping, collecting prescriptions and running errands.

CHS GROUP

£1,260 GRANT AWARDED | EAST CAMBRIDGESHIRE



CHS is all about people: their 7,000 residents, 2,000 care and support customers and team of 400 staff. Founded in 1927, they run a broad range of services across Cambridgeshire offering people opportunities to achieve a better quality of life.

An application was made to the CCCF so that the CHS Group could provide exercise and gardening equipment, arts and crafts and essential items for 15 young people who are at risk of homelessness and live in supported accommodation in Ely. The beneficiaries are aged 16-24 and as with many young people, the pandemic proved particularly challenging for them.

MELBOURN PARISH COUNCIL

£5,000 GRANT AWARDED | SOUTH CAMBS

Melbourn Coronavirus Community Response (MCCR). Melbourn is a large village (6,000 residents) in South Cambridgeshire. A group of key organisations in Melbourn came together to enable a rapid and coherent response to be made in answer to the Covid-19 health emergency. The organisation applied for the grant to increase the existing Timebank Co-ordinator's hours to oversee a team of volunteers responding to phonecalls from people in need and providing practical support



Thanks to the swift action of all involved, the MCCR was set up ready to support the community before the lockdown was declared on 23rd March. Numerous volunteers have stepped forward, with a core team staffing a 7 day a week MCCR control centre and delivering supplies to those in need. More than 500 residents registered for the services, many representing families. It is estimated that in excess of 1500 hours have been volunteered for the MCCR effort since 16 March 2020; this has helped to achieve the following:

- Delivered - 677 prescriptions
- Provided - 216 hearing aid batteries
- Fulfilled - 150 shopping requests
- Hand delivered - 3 flyers to every Melbourn household
- Written to 760 clinically vulnerable people directly to offer the services

ENABLING INDEPENDENCE

£1,000 GRANT AWARDED | PETERBOROUGH



Enabling Independence Service provide information, advice, guidance & advocacy to adults with learning disabilities and/or autism in the Peterborough area.

A £1,000 grant meant that Enabling Independence could provide food parcels or vouchers to cover food/gas/electric to people with a learning disability within Peterborough. .

"We are finding that as a charity who currently provides an advocacy service for adults with a learning disability that many clients are scared to leave the home or allowed to travel as a result of their disability. Many have low skills to understand what the guidelines or laws are now. Clients are approaching us for advice or support."

PETERBOROUGH ASYLUM AND REFUGEE COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION (PARCA)

£20,000 GRANT AWARDED | PETERBOROUGH



PARCA is a multicultural organisation that works tirelessly to champion social inclusion within society. They celebrate diversity, encourage integration. They are an inclusive charitable organisation that offers practical support to anyone regardless of gender, age, ability, race, religion, or sexual orientation.

Like many organisations, the coronavirus outbreak changed everything. Almost all face-to-face activity stopped. PARCA remained closed during lockdown. The only face-to-face services were for the isolated and vulnerable e.g. food deliveries for those unable to access this.

PARCA has been awarded a grant of £20,000 to support them financially over this very difficult time. The grant will also contribute to the hiring of a new short term Support Officer post during this crisis to help

- Managing and supporting volunteers
- Managing new outreach service
- Taking responsibility for information collection to assess new needs
- Bring in learning for community resilience
- Run essential services such as the food delivery service

With this funding they will be able to continue to address a hugely acute need for a very disadvantaged group of people - helping recent immigrants/refugees to navigate through language barriers to access benefits to be able to continue to survive.



SURVEY RESULTS

GRANT RECIPIENTS

With the pandemic continuing to threaten our communities, we knew that we needed to speak with local charities and community groups in order to understand how best to support them. We were able to do this by sending a simple survey to the organisations who had received an emergency grant. The questions can be seen below:

1. What is the immediate impact (0-6 months) of Coronavirus on your service provision and your organisation?
2. What do you anticipate the longer term (6-18 months) impact of Coronavirus will be on your organisation and your service provision? Do you anticipate needing funds in addition to what you have received from CCF to continue this work?
3. Is there anything else that CCF should know in order to effectively support you?

RECOVERY FUNDING

LONGER TERM FUNDING TO SUPPORT ORGANISATIONS

We were delighted and so grateful to all our supporters that we had beaten the initial £1m target for our Coronavirus Community Fund appeal. Initially the fund provided community organisations emergency funding to support vulnerable people affected by the pandemic. This included projects addressing: financial hardship, hunger, health issues, home education, need for self-isolation/shielding and loneliness.

Alongside awarding grants for immediate relief, particularly in local communities which experience a return to lockdown as a result of a spike in infections, we knew that the fund would need to move from solely crisis response to a recovery phase. On the 3rd August we launched the Recovery Funding grants to support organisations that help our communities recover and rebuild in the longer-term. This terrible pandemic is highlighting and worsening inequalities that already existed. We knew that we needed to support those brilliant local charities and community groups that help our most vulnerable communities. This included helping people hardest hit economically (e.g. through unemployment), young people, women & families affected by domestic violence, BAME communities, people with disabilities, etc. Sadly, because of the pandemic, many of these crucial local charities are at risk of disappearing and we need to avoid this by helping them survive and adapt to the 'new normal'.

Funding of between £10,000-25,000 was available to help secure the finances of key organisations that have lost income due to the crisis and are directly supporting vulnerable people experiencing hardship as a result of the crisis. Funding also supported key organisations to adapt their operations, services and working practices.

In particular, the fund welcomed applications from organisations targeting

- People severely economically impacted by the pandemic
- BAME communities
- Young people
- Women & families affected by domestic violence
- Supporting good mental health and well being, and people with disabilities



